

#### **EQUALITY**

is equal treatment and availability of health care services for all people.

conditions in the environments in which people are born, live, learn, work, play, worship, and age that affect a wide range of health, functioning, and quality-of-life outcomes and risks.




- More opportunities to save money

   1.65 million more.


#### **Children's Health**












## **Leading Causes of Death, 2020**

- 5. Chronic Lower Respiratory Disease


#### **Top 2 Leading Causes of Death, 2020**

#### Cancer Diagnosed at Advanced Stage, Incidence per 100,000



Individuals that are: low income, low health literacy, lack health insurance and have to travel long distances to receive screening sites are less likely to receive timely cancer screenings.
